

LETHALITY ASSESSMENT SCREEN FOR FIRST RESPONDERS

Initiating the Protocol

When to Initiate a Lethality Assessment

- When an intimate relationship is involved; AND,
- You believe an assault has occured;
- You sense the potential for danger is high;
- Names of parties or location are **repeat** names or locations; OR,
- You simply believe one should be conducted.

How to Conduct a Lethality Assessment

After telling the victim that you are concerned about their safety and would like to better understand their situation...

- Introduce the LAP screen.
- After asking questions, handle information as follows: Yes to Q.1, 2, or 3 = High-Danger Referral No to Q.1-3, but Yes to four of Q.4-11 = High-Danger Referral.
- "No" responses my still trigger High-Danger Referral if you believe it appropriate. Ask "what worries you" question to help determine whether a High-Danger Referral should be triggered in Non-High Danger screens.

All completed screens are sent to local DV organization.

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High-Danger Referral Process

- Advise victim of the High-Danger assessment results.
- Tell the victim that you need to call the LAP hotline and you would like for them to speak with the advocate. (*Remember: You are seeking the victim's permission to provide their name.*)
- If victim does not want to speak with the advocate, tell the victim that you still need to speak with the advocate and gently ask the victim to reconsider.
- If victim still does not want to speak with advocate, offer the option of just listening to the advocate's safety plan.
- Assist the advocate with safety planning if asked.
- If victim wants to leave, help arrange transportation.
- Notify your domestic violence unit or supervisor.
- Prepare report, indicate "LAP protocol followed".
- Do not include the details of their safety plan or results of the screen in the reports.
- Assess YES responses to determine if additional investigation is applicable.

Not Screened In or Did/Could Not Participate

- Ensure short term safety plan is completed.
- Advise to watch for signs of danger.
- Ensure CT Office of Victim Services card is provided.
- Advise of potential dangerous situation.
- Refer to local domestic violence organization.
- Provide first responder contact information card.
- Follow up with LAP screen if incapacitated at the time.
- Prepare report.

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
